

In light of what is happening up river at Lake Mead, it makes me think about what lies under our very own lake -Lake Mohave. I have included in this edition excerpts from the Las Vegas Age newspaper from 1921 about Tri-State in Clark County Nevada.

Not only was Lake Mohave created when Davis Dam was built, but the small mining town of Tri-State was covered by the water that filled the lake.

October 3, 1969

YESTERDAY

Above photo was taken in 1921 and shows Tri-State, Nevada. Tri-State was a small settlement directly across Colorado River from what is now Lake Mohave Resort. Miners in the river range reached it by ringing an iron gong in a mesquite tree on the Arizona side of river. Proprietor came across and picked them up in his boat. The place had a bar and offered complete mining camp entertainment facilities. Note biplane on beach, lower left.

MOHAVE

"TRI-STATE" IS NEW CLARK COUNTY TOWN

Location is Nevada Side of the Colorado River Opposite the Katherine Mine

A new town was born this week which promises to grow into a very healthy city as time goes on. It has been named Tri-State and is situated on the Nevada side of the Colorado river opposite the famous Katherine mine town on the Arizona side of the river. The promoters of the new town are James Cashman of Searchlight, A.G. Cushman of Nevada, and Edward Shaw of Kingman. They are already laying out plans for an active champaign this fall when surveyors will be on the ground to plat off the lots, locate sites for a water works plant and also a light and heat generating plant.

The mines on this side of the river near the location of the new town are the Homestake, Lucky-Prince and the Katherine Extension which is equally as rich on this side of the river as it is in Arizona.

A good road will be constructed from Hiko Springs to the river by Clark county. The road from here to the Nevada line is in good shape and with a little con't on page 2

work between the California line and Hiko Springs a fine road can be built at a nominal expense. Needles as a matter of course will be materially benefited by the new town as it is the railroad point and the distance will be cut considerably to the Union Pass country and points in Nevada. A ferry will be installed and maintained by the townsite company. Messrs. Cashman and Cushman were here last evening and met with a large number of our citizens and it is needless to add that our business men will do all they can in the matter of establishing first class road connections between here and Tri-State, or to help in anyway possible in getting the new city on its feet. - Needles Nugge

AUGUST 20, 1921

TOWN OF TRISTATE HAS SIGNS OF BOOM Mines Making Good With Development, - Much Building Activity Is Anticipated

Conditions at the new town of Tri-state on the Nevada side of the Colorado river across from the Katherine mine, indicate much activity during the next few weeks.

Mining men are beginning to reach the camp in considerable numbers, attracted by the big ore developments recently made on some of the nearby properties. Already there are a general store and an eating house in operation and travelers are well cared for.

The ferry over the Colorado river is running regularly and automobiles are crossing. The roads in that section are generally in good shape and travelers have no trouble in making the crossing.

The new road being constructed from Seachlight to the Katherine mine makes the camp easily accessible from this side and saves the necessity of making the long detour by way of Needles to reach the district.

The townsite company announces that it will begin the sale of lots soon. It is estimated that there will be not less than twenty businesses housed in Tri-State by September first. Application has been made for a post office and assurances have been received that it will be established soon.

The Katherine mine is working sinking the shaft to the 700 level. The ore shoot on which they are sinking is 1,300 feet long and according to estimates by engineers contains ore of a value of \$20,000,000.

The Gold Chain, located a short distance east of the Katherine is crosscutting its ore body. The crosscut is now in 40 feet and all in high grade milling ore.

The Lucky Prince will start work in its property about September first.

The Homestake mine has been bonded to San Francisco mining men.

September 24, 1921

TRISTATE TO BE CHRISTENED TODAY

The New Town on The Nevada Side of The Colorado The Scene of Gathering

County Commissioner James Cashman says that everybody will be given a royal welcome at the Tristate christening which occurs today at the new camp in the Katherine district on the Nevada side of the Colorado River. A regular old-time celebration has been planned which will include all the spectacular features which usually characterize similar festivities.

There will be an auction sale of lots and it goes without saying that there will be a barbeque where everybody will be expected to eat his fill. The evening will be devoted to dancing.

An interesting feature will be a race between the "Robert E Lee" and the "Natches", the two automobile ferry boats on the Colorado. Bob Hausler also expects to be there with an airplane to give the visitors a birdseye view of the camp and surrounding country. The hotel will be crowded, so "bring your own blankets" is Jim's advice.

October 1, 1921

OPENING AT TRISTATE PROVED BIG SUCCESS

Visitors From California, Arizona and Nevada Enjoy Mining Camp Hospitality

A big crowd and a fine, old-fashioned, mining camp hospitality marked the opening celebration of the new town of Tristate, near the southern point of Clark county. Visitors were present in large numbers from Kingman and other Arizona points; from Los Angeles and other sections of California, with an especially large and enthusiastic delegation from Las Vegas. Among the visitors from this city were Harley H. Harmon who was the principal speaker of the day, Sam Gay, R.E. Lake, E.E. Smith, O.J. Smith, W.F. Rector, Fred J. Pearce and others.

The new town is the center of an important mining district which is giving every indication of being about to stage the next great mining boom, for which the west has been waiting for some years. Many men prominent in the mining game were present and took occasion to look over the district and they are practically a unit in pronouncing it one of great merit. The Nevada Katherine, owned by James Cashman and Ed Shaw, gives promise of becoming one of the greatest producers in Nevada according to experts.

A number of the Vegas people continued their journey by auto to Kingman for the purpose of inspecting that thriving camp.

Editors note: From other sources I have read it appears that Tri-state developed quickly to accommodate the miners and their families that worked the Katherine District mines with multiple buildings including a store, boarding house, as well as a school district that ran from 1921 - 1924. Seeking Donations for Our Collection


